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Foreword by Mr Law, Headteacher

Home School Communications Policy

We are continually looking for ways to ensure we communicate with parents as efficiently and helpfully as possible. Thank you to all those of you have regularly taken the time to complete surveys, both online and at Parents' Evenings, which ask for your views on this, amongst other topics. The results over time tell us that this is a feature of the school which you rate highly. Likewise visitors to the school comment on the friendly reception they receive and the strong sense of community amongst staff and students. We would, however, like to draw your attention to the new Home School Communications policy that is attached to this email.

In recent years communications between home and school have shifted quite dramatically from pen and paper to email, with email becoming the preferred and predominant mode of communication. As a school we remain committed to regular and open communication with parents; however the number of emails or requests for calls and the expectation of a fairly immediate reply from some parents has increased to such a degree that we, along with many other schools, are experiencing the need to produce a new Home School Communications policy.



I hope very much that you'll agree that our first priority is to deliver high quality teaching and learning for your son/daughter. Most teachers have up to five lessons teaching per day plus tutor time, lunch duties and activities, and after school practices and clubs. Teachers cannot, therefore, monitor and manage their inbox or return calls during lessons or at other times in the day, when they should be planning and preparing for lessons, assessing student work or carrying out school duties. As Headteacher I expect my teachers' priority to be fully prepared, focused and engaged with students and supporting their learning.

Your child's tutor will also have a demanding teaching timetable and Heads of Year in our school, just like others, benefit from only a few hours extra non-teaching time a week to work on behalf of students with particular pastoral needs. Whilst administration staff, support staff and senior leaders may be able to access emails more routinely, their primary function is also to support teachers and students.

Can I encourage you, therefore, to have a read of the new policy. I offer my reassurances that it isn't designed to limit your involvement in your child's schooling. As parents we may feel that it is perfectly reasonable to ask for updates about our child's progress or behaviour and the occasional request might be manageable; however, if the parent of every child a teacher teaches asks for bespoke feedback just once in a year that would, on average, generate over 300 required responses.

The school already works hard to provide parents with timely and informative information concerning their child's progress throughout the year. Currently these are: four progress and effort reports, one full report and one parent teacher meeting each year. In addition to this staff may also telephone, write or email a parent to inform them of a serious incident or serious ongoing concerns about a child's behaviour or attitude to learning.

We also provide an online system that enables parents to view their child's attendance at lessons, behaviour and achievements by simply logging in. Parents are encouraged to use this facility. There are, therefore, many ways in which information is easily and readily available and we are not removing the chance for you to communicate with the member of staff who is most likely to be able to address any important issues you have.

We do, however, need to encourage some parents to consider the speed or regularity with which they contact school on matters that their child may well be able to deal with themselves. I hope the policy offers some clear and reasonable guidance regarding what you can expect from staff who will never be delaying replying to you but are simply in a classroom, out on a sports pitch, planning a residential trip, running a revision club, assessing work, undertaking training or working on a myriad of other tasks in support of the students in our care.

I hope that you will assist us in our quest to enable staff to focus on their jobs and therefore give your son or daughter the very best support that they can.

Year 12 Mathematical Problem Solving Afternoon

On Wednesday 6 February we had approximately 50 students from across the SJSF taking part in a problem solving afternoon. The event was hosted here at Carre's and was run by the AMSP (Advanced Maths Support Programme). An outside speaker came in for the afternoon and spoke to the students about mathematical university entrance tests, which universities now have entrance tests and the different tests that are produced. Along with this, the students worked in groups of 5 or 6 to tackle problem solving questions on the areas of number and algebra. The problems required the students to apply their mathematical knowledge and to stretch their understanding. Some of the students commented on how useful the afternoon had been and how much they had enjoyed the opportunity to work together to complete problem solving questions (which is a key skill required for maths at A-Level). The outside speaker was very impressed by the resilience of our students and very much enjoyed coming to work with them. Overall, an enjoyable and worthwhile afternoon had by all.

They were established in 2012 to help schools and organizations tackle social and emotional barriers to learning. They work in partnership with national organisations to provide schools with innovative solutions to ensure that young people reach their full educational potential. Staff across the Robert Carre Trust have experienced three training sessions which focused on student wellbeing, anxiety and the pressures our students face from social media. What a season we are having! We are into the quarter-final of the County Cup and most significantly the final of the ESFA Premier League Elite Schools' National Cup! This is a competition in which schools are allowed to play as many Premier League or Football League academy players as they like with no restrictions. The final is due to be played later in the year. We await our opponent from the other semi-final between perennial finalists Thomas Telford School and a school from Bromley in Kent. We expect it to be Thomas Telford but you can never be sure. Telford knocked us out at the quarter-final stage last season so if it is them, then we will be aiming to turn around the 2-0 defeat.

Having won our quarter-final versus St Mary's School from Hull 4-1, with a good second half display in front of most of the school, we were drawn away versus Trinity School Carlisle for the semi-final. They won their quarter-final easily, scoring 6 goals so we anticipated a tough test. We stayed overnight in Carlisle before the game so that we were not affected by the journey. When we awoke on the game day, we were greeted by constant rain and 45 mph winds. The rain subsided but the wind did not and this played a huge part in the game.

Attacking with the wind in the first half, we struggled to find the angled passes needed to not have the ball constantly running out for a goal kick and Trinity created the best chance of the half that needed Elliott to make two fantastic saves from their centre half. We put in a huge amount of effort without really creating much. We did, however, need physic attention for our two central defenders who both received head knocks, one of them from his own team mate's boot! At half time, we made one change and Alfie certainly injected some vigour into our attacking play. We were less direct into the wind and this helped. Despite Elliott having to make another spectacular save and the hosts hitting the post, we created several good chances ourselves but never being quite clinical enough to finish it off. We ended up hitting the post in the last minute of normal time which was a tough blow as it seemed as though we were about to win the game.

consists of the County Champions and runners up from Lincolnshire, Leicestershire, Nottinghamshire, Derbyshire and Northamptonshire.



Behaviour on Contract Transport

Despite frequent reminders of our expectations, we are always concerned about any unsatisfactory behaviour on the journeys to and from school. We would be grateful if you would reinforce our expectations by reminding your son about the importance of remaining seated during the journey. Behaviour such as shouting or throwing objects is clearly unacceptable. All students sign a code of conduct regarding travel which makes it clear that poor behaviour may result in a ban from using school transport.

Students also need to be aware of the local residents when they are waiting for a school bus. Good manners are expected from all our students, especially when off site.

e-Access Registration

Access to your child's online data, such as attendance information, progress grades and student events, is available via the school website: **Parents > e-Access Registration**.

ParentPay

The preferred method of payment for all school trips and music tuition is via ParentPay. If you would rather pay via an alternative method, please contact the Finance Office.

Cashless Catering

Cashless catering is in place in the school's Dining Hall ('The Chill'). Please could parents ensure that sufficient funds are uploaded onto ParentPay for their child's lunches. You should be aware that overdrafts are not permitted except in extreme circumstances.

Parents' Cars on the School Site

May we remind parents that for safety reasons we do not allow the dropping off of students on the school site after 8am. Similarly, in the afternoons, parents should not bring cars onto the site before 4.30pm.

Emergency School Closure

As we are into the winter season we would to remind parents of the arrangements for emergency school closure.

As a matter of policy the school will make every effort to remain open. However, severe weather can sometimes lead to transport problems which make it impossible for the school to function normally. In the unlikely event that the school will be closed, a notice will be posted on the front page of our website at <u>www.carres.uk</u> by 7.30 am. Information will also be posted on the Lincolnshire County Council website and the information will be broadcast on BBC Radio Lincs and Lincs FM.

The school has the facility to send text messages to inform parents of the school's closure. We will endeavour to notify all parents by text as soon as a decision has been made to close the school.

Free School Meals

If you think you might be eligible for Free School Meals, you must apply via the Lincolnshire County Council parent portal link: https://lcc.cloud.servelec-synergy.com/parentportal. LCC will process eligibility checks for Free School Meals.

Is my child eligible?

Your child may be eligible if you are in receipt of one or more of the following qualifying benefits:

- <u>Universal Credit</u> (provided you have an annual net earned income of no more than £7,400, as assessed by earnings from up to three of your most recent assessment periods)
- Income Support
- Income-based <u>Jobseeker's Allowance</u>
- Income-related Employment and Support Allowance
- Support under Part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- The guaranteed element of state <u>Pension Credit</u>
- <u>Child Tax Credit</u> (provided you're not also entitled to <u>Working Tax Credit</u> and have an annual gross income of no more £16,190)
- <u>Working Tax Credit</u> run-on paid for four weeks after you stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit

Children who get paid these benefits directly, instead of through a parent or guardian, can also get free school meals.
